

## **TEACHING TO EMPOWER**

FEMA designed STEP in modules for maximum flexibility. STEP includes three core lessons. You can teach each lesson in as little as 30 minutes. You can also incorporate five supplemental lessons on specific disasters — Severe Weather, Earthquake, Fire, Flood, and Pandemic Emergencies. A series of Youtube videos for kids, called Disaster Dodgers, helps introduce each concept, while an additional activity book offers 18 activities to reinforce ideas and jumpstart creativity.
